Safe travel to school

It is lovely to see so many of the children walking, scooting and cycling to school. We are very lucky to be situated in a quiet residential area, away from main roads and articulated traffic. However, I am very conscious that the narrow roads around the school and limited car parking can cause difficulties for parents who have no option but to drive their children to school.

As the days shorten and the nights draw in please ensure that bikes have lights and that children wear helmets and bright clothing. Remind children when scooting to remain on the path, be considerate to pedestrians and to consider wearing a helmet. I will lead a whole-school assembly when we return to school after half-term to remind them about being 'safe and seen'.

I appreciate that for those families who live outside of the village, it is not feasible to walk or cycle to school. However, the front of the school can be very congested at the start and end of the school day so I would urge all members of our community (staff included!) to leave their car at home if they can. If you absolutely have to bring your car, please reduce your speed when turning in to Jopling Way and consider parking towards the top of Jopling Way and walking your child down the last few hundred metres, reducing congestion at the school entrance. Let's work together to ensure all of our children have a safe journey.

Uniform: There are still a few children who are wearing PE kit on days that are not their PE days. Please ensure that your child is dressed in appropriate uniform.

A few polite reminders:

Lunches: We are trying to encourage independence and promote choice for KS2 in the lunch hall by allowing the children to serve themselves from the salad bar and choose their own dessert. We hope that this will reduce food waste and encourage children to select salad items that they like and will eat.

Morning routine: Safeguarding is of paramount important to us. Therefore, to ensure that we can secure the school promptly at 8.55am, we will be trialling a new recording system from Monday morning. If when you arrive the gate is closed, you will be greeted by a member of school staff who will welcome your child into school and make a note of the time and reason for lateness.
